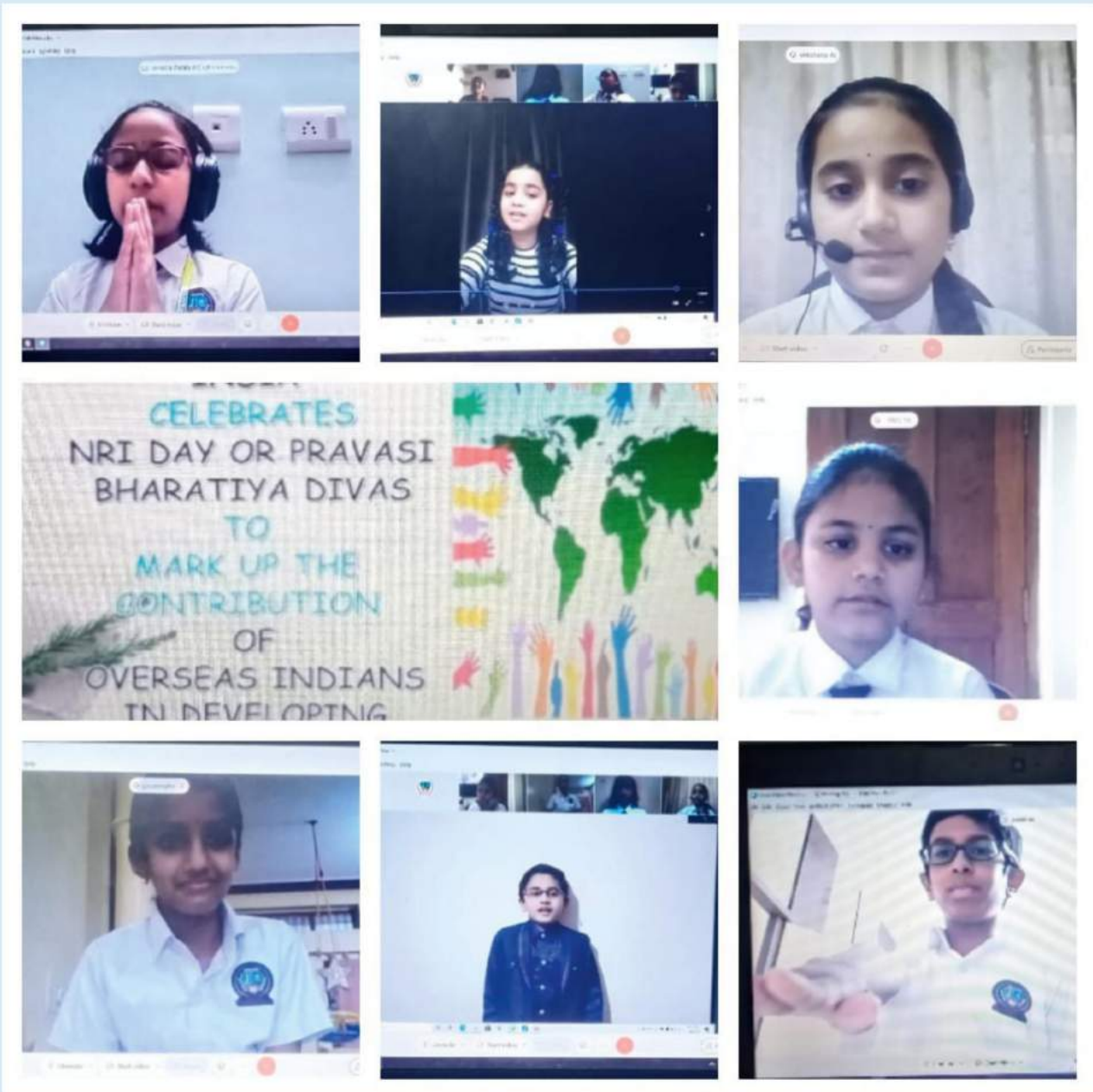


As part of the Science week celebrations many science related activities were held during the week. The aim of celebrating science week was to enhance the understanding of science amongst the students and also to create an interest.

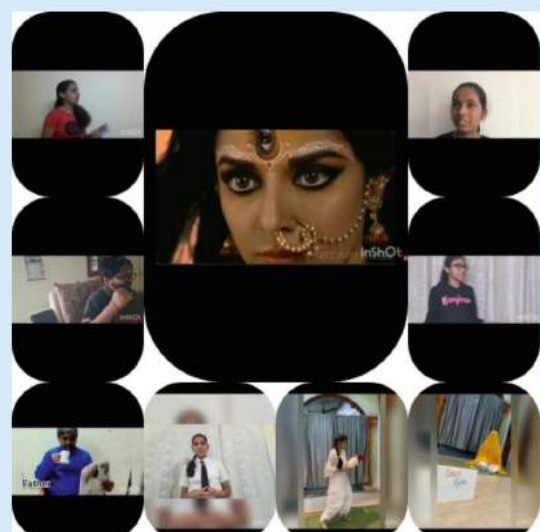
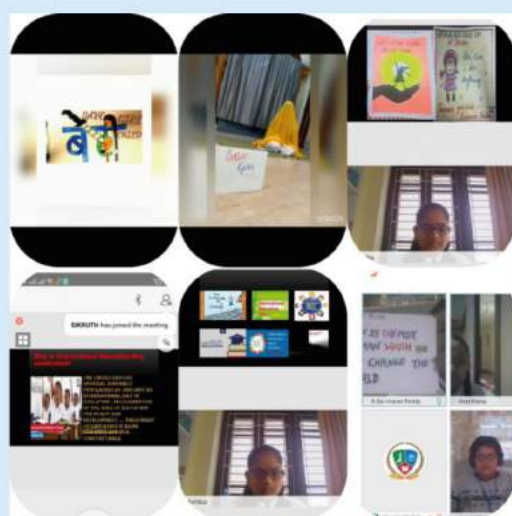


.International Day of Education and National Girl Child day was celebrated through a special assembly today.
